**IOM Country Office in Finland** provides training for Finland-bound quota refugees. This helps the refugees to integrate into the Finnish society and begin a new life. IOM supports the integration of refugees both before and after their resettlement in Finland.



# **IOM AND QUOTA REFUGEES**

IOM Country Office in Finland organizes the resettlement of quota refugees arriving from departure countries to the Nordic countries. In addition, the Country Office organizes Pre-Departure Cultural Orientation for quota refugees selected for Finland and Iceland.

The orientation trainings provide the refugees with basic facts about their new home country and prepares them for their integration process.

The amount of refugees and their countries of origin may vary annually. Finland has decided to

select the majority of quota refugees from conflict zones and in the past years the largest numbers have been Congolese and Syrians.

Since 2001 IOM Country Office in Finland has organized Pre-Departure Cultural Orientation for more than 4000 quota refugees in 13 countries. Globally IOM has organized Pre-Departure Cultural Orientations for over 500 000 refugees in more than 70 countries.

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# BEFORE AND AFTER RESETTLEMENT

**IOM Country Office in Finland** contributes to the integration continuum by organizing cultural orientations in the departure countries and supporting the implementation of postarrival civic orientations in Finland.

### **CULTURAL ORIENTATION**

Cultural orientation offers refugees practical information about their new home country and resettlement. It also familiarizes the quota refugees with Finnish language and encourages towards active participation and agency.

Currently the orientations are organized in cooperation with the Diaconia University of Applied Sciences in the <u>FINCO 2018–2021</u> project coordinated by the Finnish Immigration Service.

#### **CIVIC ORIENTATION**

The civic orientation provided in native languages, developed by the Finnish Refugee Council, supports refugees' capacity to become full members of society.

The civic orientations courses are part of the <u>Navigator – Towards Diverse</u> <u>Municipalities 2018-2021</u> project implemented by the IOM Country Office in Finland, the Finnish Refugee Council and Diaconia University of Applied Sciences.
